Asking Questions Well

For Starters:

- Be prayerful
- Know the passage you're reading in context Planning 1 on 1s:

First things First: Find the Main Point of the passage.

- What do I want them to realize about God?
- What do I want them to realize about <u>Themselves</u>? What do I want them to <u>Do</u>?

Asking good questions:

- Ask questions that help them come to <u>Conclusions</u>.
- help them to help themselves: Ask them the questions you think they should be asking about the text
 - o Theological questions: questions about God and how he relates to the world
 - o Gospel questions: questions that help them relate this text to the gospel
 - o Reflection questions: questions the make someone look inward
 - o Application questions: Questions that help them apply the text

Helpful tips:

- If there is something admirable about the author, or a key character in the text, ask questions to help them identify what those things are
 Be patient as people come to conclusions
 Define words together!
- Provide helpful context
- Ask if they have questions or if anything is confusing. Are they challenged by anything?
- Sit on something longer if you think it's important
- Ask them to summarize important points

Example: James 1:2-5

Main point: God is purposeful in our trials. He desires partnership with us and provides us with Joy and Wisdom if we ask in faith.

^{***}This is a basic outline for your 1 on 1s**

- 1. What do I want them to realize about God? <u>He gives wisdom and can give joy even in</u> hard times
 - Questions to ask:
 - What does James seem to believe about God?
 What does this say about God's nature?
- 2. What do I want them to realize about themselves? <u>Any negative attitudes they may have</u> towards trial & that they can partner with God in their trials.
 - Questions to ask:
 - Are there any trials in your life right now?
 - How do you typically respond to a trial?
 - What hints can you take from James on how to approach that situation?
- 3. What do I want them to do? <u>Seek God for wisdom in prayer</u> •

Questions to ask:

- Has anything challenged you from this reading?
- Help them create a <u>SMART goal</u>
 - Ex: "I'm going to set a timer on my phone each day this week at 9pm to pray and ask God for wisdom in my trial"



Do: Set real numbers with real deadlines.

Don't: Say, "I want more visitors."



Do: Make sure your goal is trackable.

Don't: Hide behind buzzwords like, "brand engagement," or, "social influence."



Do: Work towards a goa that is challenging, but possible

Don't: Try to take over the world in one



Do: Be honest with yourself- you know what you and your team are capable of.

Don't: Forget any hurdles you may have to



Do: Give yourself a deadline.

Don't: Keep pushing towards a goal you might hit, "some day."
